

International Relations Theory – Views Beyond the West

5. Purpose

Please give the principal aims of the project (3-4 lines)

The main aim of the project is to bring International Relations (IR) Theory scholars from around the world for a workshop at AUI to discuss and potentially finalize an IR theory textbook, in English, and apply for it to be published within the "Worlding Beyond the West Book Series" of Routledge Publishers.

6. Background and Rationale

This proposal meets three of the main purposes called for by the university policy research grant: it helps me to keep up with my field through research, it supports me as well as all faculty teaching International Relations (IR) Theory around the world in the pursuit of continuous enhancement of teaching, and it helps me in my efforts to carry out research and to publish. Moreover, it provides AUI with a leading role in a worldwide project that will be beneficial to both AUI and IR students around the world. This project also meets one of the main complaints of AUI students concerning the use of textbooks mainly produced in North America and Western Europe, by scholars from those two continents, and reflecting issues and challenges proper to those two areas of the world. This is hence the opportunity to provide our students with a textbook that deals with issues and challenges closer to their concerns. It is important to add here that this textbook will not be meant as a substitution to the current ones, but as a substantial addition to them, and an addition that aims at being taken seriously –and thus proposed as a textbook- not only in the Third World, but also in the West.

7. Outline Description of the Project

Please give the research methodology, including a distribution of tasks among team members

There are several great International Relations Theory textbooks, bringing different perspectives on the Field. The field has known a broadening of its perspectives which has allowed for the inclusion of perspectives far from the mainstream. Gender studies, Marxist and Critical Theory perspectives, as well as Post-Modern or Environment/Green views are increasingly present in the IR theory readers. Some have also included a Post-Colonial perspective.

There is a missing element in all these perspectives: views from the so-called Third World on what is (or should be) IR theory in general, on these theories in particular, and on how should they be taught. These Third World views on what should IR theory be range from referring to Third World issues and examples as well as to Third World authors and concepts. This is not the privilege of IR, since many concepts we refer to are so western bound that we do not realize that the medieval era was not necessarily a dark age for Muslims, that the Enlightenment immediately enlightened mainly Europeans, but not necessarily Latin Americans or Africans, and that colonization had a different impact on Africans and Asians than on Europeans. This means however that a de-western-centralization –without necessarily Provincializing Europe, as Chakrabarty titled his book- of knowledge has become an urgent need, and that this needs to be launched immediately.

What brings the International to those who are in the Third World is the mode of their insertion in it, an unfavorable and dependent insertion. However, it is also a necessary, and in many cases, very old, insertion, and in many occasions, an important one, without which some major achievements would not have been possible.

There are two objectives in the present proposal: problematize the widespread division of labor according to which the West/Center produces theories –that are deemed universal- and non-western/out-of-center scholars consume these theories and apply them in their regional context, providing them with richness merely from an empirical perspective. This division of labor should not exist, and should not be accepted. The other objective hence is to provide Third World students with concepts, debates and authors who are not exclusively from the United States and Europe, and who deal with and reflect upon issues and challenges with which they can relate and that are relevant to them.

This project hence deals with questions such as: does an IR theory put together in the Third World necessarily look like a “Problem Solving Theory” by the Third World for the Third World? What does it mean to give voice to these silenced voices? Does it mean to necessarily hold critical views on IR?

In any case, the book will avoid being presented under the traditional format of first what realists say, and then how the others reacted to them. This usually gives ontological and epistemological prominence to realism, and presents the others as mere reactions to excesses and potential mistakes of realism.

The book will be divided into two parts: a first one will deal with concepts, and a second one with theoretical thinking that comes from the Third World.

Concepts:

International: what is the International, and how are we inserted in it, and who are the players?

Colonization/Decolonization: Impact, from both a short term and a long term perspective.

Sovereignty and the state: How is sovereignty relevant? Who is sovereign? How does the state fit in this debate?

Power: How is power expressed? Who holds it?

Security: what is the impact of securitization and de-securitization as concepts, what are the other threats to security?

Development: Is this the main concern? Is this the defining issue of the insertion of the Third World/periphery in the international? Is this a dependent insertion, a view that still relies on a dichotomy of center to be emulated and periphery to reproduce the center?

Foreign Policy: how foreign is it? How exclusively political is it? Aren't defense, trade and domestic policies aspects of foreign policy making?

Theories:

Peripheral Realism, Dependency and World-System, Post-Colonialism, Post-Colonial Gender studies.

Scholars who have agreed to participate in the book, and who have discussed it are: Arlene B. Tickner (Universidad de los Andes, Colombia), Pinar Bilgin (Bilkent University, Turkey), Karen Smith (University of Cape Town, South Africa), João Pontes Nogueira (Pontificia Universidade Catolica do Rio de Janeiro, Brazil), as well as scholars from Western Europe and North America who have been supportive of this initiative. We met informally and discussed the book project at the Montreal conference of the ISA (March 2011), and we advanced on the terms of the project through email exchanges over the last few months. The objective of the workshop is then to provide all these scholars with an opportunity to discuss, in an academic setting, each of the contributions to /chapters of the book and to finalize the last draft in view of the publication of the textbook in 2013.

In this sense, there is no specific research methodology entailed in this project. Scholars from different parts of the world will meet in a workshop in Ifrane to discuss and finalize the production of an IR textbook. This textbook will be edited by an AUI scholar, providing the university with a leading role in an important international project.

8. Anticipated Outcomes and Implications

The organization of a workshop at AUI in June 2012 and the subsequent publication of an IR textbook, in English, by Routledge Publishers, in 2013.

*Teaching, Research, and International Policy (TRIP) Project
Faculty Survey Sample Codebook*

Updated as of April 1, 2014

Introduction

The Teaching, Research, and International Policy (TRIP) Project at the College of William & Mary explores the teaching and research practices in the international relations (IR) discipline to help bridge the gap between theory and practice. The TRIP Faculty Survey, issued every 2-3 years, is one part of this larger project. The survey began in 2004 by sampling only scholars in the United States. The 2014 version, which will be the fifth wave of the survey, expands the sample to more than 30 countries.

The purpose of this codebook is to explain the methodology and rationale behind the identification of international relations (IR) scholars in the 2014 TRIP Faculty Survey sample. In general, we seek to distinguish IR scholars from those in other disciplines of political science.

Methodology

We begin by compiling lists of universities in our survey countries. The United States list is produced by combining the schools from *U.S. News & World Report's* 2013-2014 college rankings with U.S. military academies, Claremont Graduate University, and Monterey Institute for International Studies (which are not included in the rankings).

The Canadian list is produced from *MacLean's* college rankings. Other lists were provided by our local country partners (typically international relations scholars living in or with close ties to that country) or from a UNESCO database of universities. Local partners are allowed to use country specific expertise to adjust the criteria for eligible institutions.

We (or our local country partners) identify IR scholars at each university by searching university websites, curriculum vitae, class schedules, and published articles. Coders identify the name, gender, academic rank, email, and personal webpage of each eligible scholar. In addition, coders record a "reason for inclusion" field which is used by the Principal Investigators to manually screen the lists after they

are compiled.¹

In some cases, a school's website does not list a professor's area of expertise or classes taught. In these cases we contact the departments directly by phone and/or email to discover the identity of IR scholars at these schools.

In order to be considered for inclusion in the sample, scholars must meet one of the following conditions:

1. Individual is affiliated with a political science unit² at a university, such as a department of government.
2. Individual is affiliated with a professional or policy school (e.g. Kennedy School of Government).
3. Individual is affiliated with a research institute at a university (e.g. Hoover Institution).

Interdisciplinary programs (e.g. Departments of Social Science) in which scholars teach or research international relations are considered.

Coders are instructed to use the university's website to identify all political science units to the best of their ability. A separate list of these units is provided to the Principal Investigators for manual review.

Broadly, professors with either teaching or research interests in IR qualify, which is defined as ***when the independent or dependent variables cross an international border***.³

Coders are provided a list of "keywords" to guide their search.

Scholars are excluded if their teaching and research only list comparative political economy, area studies, or comparative politics. Similarly, professors who hold trans-national interests but only focus on a particular region (e.g. Latin American Politics) do not qualify.

¹ We do not use member lists of the ISA or the APSA sections on IR. Such a sampling technique would omit a huge percentage of faculty teaching and doing research in IR, and in the case of the ISA would include numerous non-political scientists and area studies specialists. Further, such a technique would introduce selection bias in favor of research universities and active researchers. Our technique allows us to make these factors variables to be analyzed, rather than selection criteria.

² We define a political science unit as an academic unit primarily focused on the study of politics, political behavior, and/or political theory.

³ An exception to this rule is that scholars affiliated with an eligible research institute who qualify through their research interests alone must also teach at the university (in any discipline).

The following principles are used to identify whether a scholar's teaching or research qualified as IR:

- *Teaching*: International relations is the primary theme of the course (i.e. The Politics of Global Governance would qualify as IR; a course on international law with a short discussion of global governance would not count).
- *Research*: The scholar must list at least one IR topic as a research interest⁴; if no list is available, the scholar must exhibit some sustained interest in IR topics, even if those topics do not make up the majority of his/her work.

Individuals affiliated with professional/policy schools and interdisciplinary programs are given extra scrutiny to ensure that their teaching and/or research concern matters of politics.

Finally, the 2014 sample is checked against the 2011 survey sample, which was compiled in a similar manner as listed above. Any scholars who are included in 2011 but excluded in 2014 are individually reviewed by the Principal Investigators.

Keywords for Coders:

Scholars who teach or have research interests in the following subject areas are considered as IR scholars and are included in the sample:

- Bi-lateral Studies
- European Integration/European Union
- Foreign Aid, Lending, and International Development⁵
- Foreign Policy (in general)
- Foreign Policy of Country X
- Global Environmental Governance
- Global Health Governance
- Immigration/Migration
- International Conflict
- Politics of International Law
- International Organizations/Institutions/Cooperation
- International Peace, Justice, and/or Human Rights⁶

⁴ In rare cases, we exclude scholars that list an over-abundance of research interests. If a scholar lists an unusually high number of research interests, coders evaluate their research publications and CV to determine whether IR is a core research interest of that scholar. A very small number of scholars are subject to this additional check.

⁵ We exclude scholars who do purely comparative development studies, such as the domestic politics of development or country-specific randomized control trials.

- International Political Economy⁷
- International Resource Competition
- International Security (incl. terrorism)⁸
- Introduction to IR/International Politics/Global Politics, etc.
- IR Theory
- Globalization (politics of)
- Regional Integration
- Trans-national social movements

Research Interests Non-Qualifiers:

While there are many issues that are interesting to IR scholars and are an important part of IR research and teaching, these subjects must be addressed within an international context for the scholar to qualify for the sample. Simply addressing these issues within a single country study or in a comparative way do not qualify. We do **not** consider the following subjects as inherently “IR” and coders are instructed to examine whether the subject matter is taught or researched from an international perspective by examining syllabi, published articles, etc.

- Human Rights
- Ethnic Conflict
- Comparative Political Economy
- Inter-governmental Relations (including federalism)
- International Economics
- Regional Studies
- Democratization⁹

⁶ We include scholars who teach in Peace Studies departments as long as they approach the field from a political science perspective. Scholars who focus on individual countries or approach the study from a sociological, anthropological, economic, or historical perspective do not qualify.

⁷ We make a distinction between international political economy (IPE) from a political science perspective and IPE from an economics perspective. We include only scholars teaching or researching IPE from a political science perspective. When a professor teaches or researches in IPE we considered secondary indicators such as their degree field, their published research work, and their CV to determine their disciplinary “perspective.”

⁸ Teaching or research on terrorism must cross an international border to qualify (i.e. Study of sub-state terrorism such as the ETA would not qualify, whereas international Islamic terrorism would qualify).

⁹ We include scholars who study states promoting democratization or who explain democratization with reference to international factors.

Teaching, Research, and International Policy “TRIP” Country Partner Agreement: 2017 Survey

About the TRIP Project

The Teaching, Research, and International Policy (TRIP) Project collects data on the discipline of international relations in order to better understand the field’s present structure and to study how the field develops and changes over time. As part of this effort, we conduct a periodic survey of international relations scholars, the TRIP Faculty Survey, in the United States and around the world.

We have administered the TRIP Faculty Survey six times since 2004 and have expanded the scope and content of the survey with each wave. In 2014 the TRIP Faculty Survey included 32 unique surveys sent to 32 different countries. For more information on the TRIP project, including the faculty survey, see: <https://trip.wm.edu/home/index.php>.

The TRIP PIs administer the survey in the United States. For most other countries, TRIP partners with local scholars to help build the local sample and encourage local faculty to respond to the survey. In some countries we have gotten strong response rates, and this typically occurs when we work in partnership with a scholar or group of scholars who have strong ties to the local IR community. Our partners assist by helping tailor the survey to fit the local context. In return, partners are allowed to put their own questions in Section 5 of the survey that goes only to respondents in the partner country. The terms and benefits of the role are more clearly outlined in the agreement below.

We plan to field the next wave of the TRIP Faculty Survey in autumn of 2017. The exact timing of the non-U.S. surveys can be changed to account for local contexts.

The country partner agrees to:

1. Sign a letter asking their colleagues in their country to participate in the survey;
2. Help construct the sample of professors who will receive the survey with the guidance of the TRIP Sample Collection Codebook; or quality check the sample provided by TRIP PIs to ensure it meets the guidelines of the TRIP Sample Collection Codebook;
3. Review survey questions and work with TRIP researchers to ensure that all questions or response options are meaningful and culturally sensitive to IR scholars in a particular national/regional context;
4. Advise TRIP on local languages in which to conduct the survey. If a language other than English is required, assist in the translation of the survey into the local language and/or review previous translations for accuracy.

5. Country Partner will properly identify works produced using TRIP data using language such as ‘data used to support this effort was collected through Teaching, Research, and International Policy (TRIP), a survey effort conducted by the Institute for Theory and Practice of International Relations at the College of William and Mary. The country partner should use the following citation:

“The Global Study of International Relations,” by Daniel Maliniak, Susan Peterson, Ryan Powers, and Michael Tierney. 2016. TRIP Working Paper.

What we agree to:

1. Acknowledge country partner participation on the TRIP website.
2. Create a country-specific survey section of country partner questions that would go to colleagues in your country. Subject to the review of TRIP Principal Investigators and William and Mary IRB, these can be questions on topics such as, contemporary issues in foreign policy, IR, academia, etc;
3. Allow local partners early access to their country’s data before it is released;
4. Prepare a flat export of country-specific data excepting data that would compromise the confidentiality of respondents.
5. Provide access to an aggregate reporting tool via the TRIP website to assist with data analysis.
6. Additional support on embargoed questions, including running pre-written code on unreleasable questions in standard statistical software (such as R or STATA);
7. For a period of up to one year, or until the country partner produces a paper specific to their country using the TRIP survey data, whichever comes first, we: will provide country partners access to results from their country’s survey, consistent with William & Mary’s IRB requirements; agree not to publish results from the country-specific section discussed in point 2 above; and agree not to share the results from the country-specific section discussed in point 2 above until 12 months after the local survey closes. We may agree to withhold publication of the country-specific results even longer if the country partner wishes to publish with them first.



The Chair thanked all those present in the meeting.












Article 1 - Accession to the *grant agreement* of the other *beneficiaries*

1. All the *beneficiaries* together form the *consortium* (the "*consortium*").

2. The *coordinator* shall send to the *Commission* one duly completed and signed Form A per *beneficiary* at the latest 45 calendar days after the entry into force of the *grant agreement*. The two remaining signed originals shall be kept, one by the *coordinator* to be made available for consultation at the request of any *beneficiary*, and the other by the *beneficiary* concerned.

3. Should any legal entity identified above, fail or refuse to accede to the *grant agreement* within the deadline established in the previous paragraph, the *Commission* is no longer bound by its offer to the said legal entity(ies). The *consortium* may propose to the *Commission*, within the time-limit to be fixed by the latter, appropriate solutions to ensure the implementation of the *project*. The procedure established in Annex II for amendments to this *grant agreement* will apply.

4. The *beneficiaries* are deemed to have concluded a *consortium agreement* (the "*consortium agreement*") regarding the internal organisation of the *consortium*.

Article 2 - Scope

The *Union* has decided to grant a financial contribution for the implementation of the *project* as specified in Annex I, called *The role of Governments in the Resolution of Socioeconomic and Political Conflict in India and Europe (CURE)* (the "*project*") within the framework of the *SPI Cooperation*, and under the conditions laid down in this *grant agreement*.

Article 3 - Duration and start date of the project

The duration of the *project* shall be 36 months from 1st January 2011 (hereinafter referred to as the "start date").

Article 4 - Reporting periods and language of reports

The *project* is divided into reporting periods of the following duration:

- P1: from month 1 to month 18
- P2: from month 19 to the last month of the *project*.

Any report and deliverable, when appropriate, required by this *grant agreement* shall be in *English*.

Article 5 - Maximum financial contribution of the Union

1. The maximum financial contribution of the *Union* to the *project* shall be EUR 2,366,173.00 (two million three hundred and sixty six thousand one hundred and seventy three EURO). The actual financial contribution of the *Union* shall be calculated in accordance with the provisions of this *grant agreement*.

2. Data is on the financial contribution of the *Union* are contained in Annex I to this *grant agreement* which includes:

- a table of the estimated breakdown of budget and financial contribution of the *Union* per activity to be carried out by each of the *beneficiaries* under the *project*. *Beneficiaries* are allowed to transfer budget between different activities and between themselves in so far as the work is carried out as foreseen in Annex I.

Article 6 - Pre-financing

A pre-financing of EUR 1,419,703.00 (one million four hundred and nineteen thousand seven hundred and three EURO) shall be paid to the *coordinator* within 45 days following the date of entry into force of this *grant agreement*. The *coordinator* shall distribute the pre-financing only to the *beneficiaries* who have acceded to the *grant agreement* and after the minimum number of *beneficiaries* required by the *Rules for Participation* as detailed in the call for proposals to which the *project* is related, have acceded to the *grant agreement*.

Beneficiaries hereby agree that the amount of EUR 118,200.60 (one hundred and eighteen thousand three hundred and eight EURO and sixty five cents), corresponding to the *beneficiaries'* contribution to the Guarantee Fund referred to in Article 15.20 and representing 5% of the maximum financial contribution of the *Union* referred to in Article 5.1, is transferred in their name by the *Coordination* from the pre-financing into the Guarantee Fund. However, *beneficiaries* are deemed to have received the full pre-financing referred to in the first indent and will have to justify it in accordance with the *grant agreement*.

Article 7 - Special clauses

The following special clauses apply to this *grant agreement*:

Special clause 39

In addition to Article 11.30.4, *beneficiaries* shall deposit an electronic copy of the published version or the final manuscript accepted for publication of a scientific publication relating to *foreground* published before or after the final report, in an institutional or subject-based repository at the moment of publication.

Beneficiaries are required to make their best efforts to ensure that this electronic copy becomes freely and electronically available to anyone through this repository:

- immediately if the scientific publication is published "open access", i.e. if an electronic version is also available free of charge via the publisher, or
- within 12 months of publication.

3. In case of refusal of the notification or absence of the recipient, the *beneficiary* or the *coordinator*, as the case may be, is deemed to have been notified on the date of the latest delivery. If notification to the *coordinator* has been sent to one of the addresses mentioned in paragraphs 1 and 2 and to their legal representative, other *beneficiaries* are deemed to have been notified if notification has been sent to the address mentioned in Article 1.1.

4. Any communication or request relating to the processing of personal data (Article 11.13) shall be submitted, using the address(es) for the *Commission* identified in paragraphs 1 and 2, to the Controller responsible for the processing, Head of Unit of Social Sciences and Humanities.

Article 9 - Applicable law and competent court

The financial contribution of the Union is a contribution from the Union's research budget with the aim to implement the 7th Research Framework Programme (FP7) and it is incumbent on the Commission to execute FP7. Accordingly, this *grant agreement* shall be governed by the terms of this *grant agreement*, the European Community and European Union acts related to FP7, the Financial Regulation applicable to the general budget and its implementing rules and other European Community and European Union law and, on a subsidiary basis, by the law of Belgium.

Furthermore, the *beneficiary* is aware and agrees that the Commission may take a decision to impose pecuniary obligations, which shall be enforceable in accordance with Article 299 of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union and Articles 164 and 192 of the Treaty establishing the *European Atomic Energy Community*.

Notwithstanding the Commission's right to directly adopt the recovery decisions referred to in the previous paragraph, the General Court, or on appeal, the Court of Justice of the European Union, shall have sole jurisdiction to hear any dispute between the Union and any *beneficiary* concerning the interpretation, application or validity of this *grant agreement* and the validity of the decision mentioned in the second paragraph.

Article 10 - Application of the *grant agreement* provisions

Any provision of this part of the *grant agreement* shall take precedence over the provisions of any of the Annexes. The provisions of Annex III shall take precedence over the provisions of Annex II, and both shall take precedence over the provisions of Annex I.

The special clauses set out in Article 7 shall take precedence over any other provisions of this *grant agreement*.

<p>In the post-Cold War world is witnessing the emergence of new forms of intra-state conflicts accompanied by a weakening of the nation state's traditional means of dealing with these. There is a visible need for substantial revision in conventional approaches and strategies aimed at transforming such conflicts. Conflict resolution agendas have in the last two decades for the most part been shaped by the political objective of bringing political and economic liberalization in the name of promoting of human rights, rule of law and democracy. However, these strategies often fail to take into consideration the complex social and cultural contexts of the local level. There is a gap in knowledge about the impact that governance agencies have on local conflict dynamics, especially in the cases where identity mobilisation is a prominent factor in the conflict. This project will analyse the premises and operation of governance initiatives in conflict transformation processes through a combination of fieldwork, qualitative analysis and theory development. It will carry out case studies encompassing recent governance practices in Bihar, Bosnia, Cyprus, Georgia, North East India and Kashmir. The project will be conducted in collaboration between Indian and European research teams. The project will review and critique current approaches to conflict resolution in an attempt to revise and improve both the theoretical and operational sides of conflict resolution and peace building. It will facilitate a reciprocal learning process between appropriate parties of the European Union and Indian actors and policy makers in order to enhance the perspectives and methods of both. The project will result in a variety of outputs, including a report series addressed to both EU and Indian policy makers, a variety of local level consultations, two large international conferences, a series of scholarly articles and working papers for the research community, and a scholarly book. A high-profile web forum will be developed to enhance communication between researchers, policy-makers, practitioners and the wider public.</p>


